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# **Number 75 for Tim**

The pundits reckon Tim Seres secured his 75th Australian Open title last night when his team defeated the CORNELL team in the Gold Coast Teams final. It was the first local (Australian) win this century.

Some more numbers:

This was Tim's 41st Surfers, the first without Mary McMahon. It's the 13th time he has won this

event. The vugraph panel reckon Tim has played around 800,000 bridge hands!

Tim played with Zoly Nagy. Their partners were Ron Klinger and Bruce Neill, who completed the double, having won the Pairs earlier this week.

The CORNELL team featured three of last year's winners, with David Stern, Mike's brother-in-law in for Malcolm Mayer. In their semi, they smashed CUMMINGS the Level 2 winners. In the other semi, SERES won a tight contest against the Indonesian ASBI team by 4 IMPs. Bruce observed later that it was his first ever win against an Indonesian team.

As is often the case, the standard of play in the final was average, with tiredness a factor. Thursday was a long day for the 4-person teams – 56 Swiss boards followed by the first 20 boards of the Semis. Then 60 more yesterday, culminating in 20 boards on David Grimshaw's VuGraph at night.

The final was virtually level coming to the 20-board vu-graph as about 200 spectators filed in.

While SERES were solid, CORNELL had some blind spots. Tom Jacob went down in a vulnerable game, Cornell - Stern missed an easy slam and Richard J played a hopeless 3NT. They lost the set 33-2. This

Same auction in both rooms.  $6\diamondsuit$  is cold but both EW pairs took the money. The declarers made  $\clubsuit$ AK, two ruffs and the  $\heartsuit$ A for -800.

+1100 is possible on card-perfect defence. East leads a diamond, then comes a spade to the jack, the ♠A then the spectacular ♡K. This shuts out declarer's ♣9.

34 IMPs down with 10 to go is a tough ask but CORNELL started well. First Klinger - Neill missed a game then Seres - Nagy played a failing

Still chasing, Richard J raised his partner's 1NT opening straight to game with

Not a success and another 11 out when  $4\nabla$  was cold.

With a few boards to go, CORNELL were back to 30 IMPs adrift, an impossible run rate. As Ish observed, they needed some wides and no balls, or perhaps a well-timed phone call to Ron's mobile!

The final margin was 32 IMPs, then the winners shouted the room to drinks in the Tilba Room.

# More finals

Also on Friday, the final of the Seniors and Restricted teams were held. In the Seniors, with Playoff

Some pairs found it tough to avoid this slam from Friday morning.

If West opens 1 $\heartsuit$ , it will be hard to restrain East. Yes there is a thing called Keycard Blackwood but some don't play it, or forget it ...

NZer Chris Prent bid and made 6♥. He won the diamond lead and played a heart to the queen, which North reasonably ducked. When the ♥J was led next, North hopped on it, to partner's disappointment. South was quick to apologize - "Sorry, I should have played the king on the first round." What a partner!

This is a possible auction. West looks to have 4-2-5-2 and the ♣K (for 2NT) so it should be possible to ruff a club. Which brings me to possibly the worst two plays ever perpetrated to a single trick

South led the ♠K against 7♥. Declarer called for the ♥A?? on which South mysteriously dropped the 10?? +2210.

Say you reach 7NT. A spade lead shoots it but you can make via a double squeeze on any other lead. Pity it wasn't matchpoints, the real game.
