North led the A and switched to A and A and A. North won and played a third spade, ruffed in dummy and West discarding A. Declarer ran the A, played the A to the A, cashed A, ruffed the A and had ten tricks for +170.

Against West's 5 $\checkmark$ , North led the  $\bigstar$ 4. South won and cashed the  $\bigstar$ A: nine – queen (denying the  $\bigstar$ K) –  $\bigstar$ 4. South reverted to the  $\bigstar$ 2: jack – king – nine. That was one down, North-South +50 and 6 Imps to China.

East-West would have done better, of course, by defending against  $4 \bigstar$ . The defence can always come to a heart, two diamonds and a club. If West leads the  $\bigstar J$ , not farfetched, the defence will take  $\bigstar K$ ,  $\bigstar A$ , diamond ruff, the  $\bigstar A$  and later a club for two down, +100 and a loss of 2 Imps instead of 6. Best would be for East-West to double  $4 \bigstar$  and collect 300 and +4 Imps instead of -6. How can that be achieved?

Some pairs play a double of  $4 \ge$  as takeout. For others, the double of  $4 \ge$  is penalties. Another choice for a double of  $4 \ge$  especially and possibly  $4 \lor$  as well is the 'Do What's Right' double. Essentially the double says, 'I have adequate values and am prepared for you to bid to the 5-level or to pass for penalties. Do what you think is right.' Bidding  $5 \lor$  or  $5 \diamondsuit$  over  $4 \ge$  is committal. Double gives partner choices. The advantage of this double is (a) You have not committed your side to the 5-level and (b) If partner makes the wrong choice, it is not your fault. ( $\bigcirc$ )

Suppose East makes a 'Do what's right' double' over  $4 \pm$  in the above deal. South passes and West, with only 13 HCP including the wasted spade honours and facing a passed partner, should have no problem passing for penalties. Even if West leads the  $\forall A$ , East should play the  $\forall J$  (or  $\forall 8$ ) as suit-preference for the higher suit, diamonds. West switches to the  $\diamond J$  and East-West collect 300.

West won and played the A to the A, followed by the J, winning, the A to the Q and the A. Then came the J to the K, a diamond ruff, a club ruff in dummy and West had 10 tricks, +170.

West led the ♦J, queen, king. East cashed ♦A and ♦10. West discarded ♥2, asking for a club switch. East played the ♣7, five, queen, and West returned the ♣9. South won with the ♣A, crossed to the ♠K and came back to the A, one down, East-West +50.

North led the ♣J. South took the ♣A and switched to the ♠A and the ♠2 to the ♠K. North returned the ♦9, ace. Declarer ran the ♥8, repeated the heart finesse, cashed the ♥A and then played the ♦J: two – six – five. 'That ♦9 didn't fool me.' West made ten tricks, -50, 3 Imps to USA2.
