190. The light side of bridge

What would you do now as South with:


- **★** K97
- **♥** A10
- ♦ AQJ1086
- ♣ AK

Partner is a passed hand and is likely to have a negative hand. It might be helpful to protect the ♠K from the opening lead and so you could bid 2NT, showing 23-24 points. You have only 21 HCP, but the long, strong diamonds certainly make up for the lack of a couple points. Some would even consider a rebid of 3NT. That is not safe, of course, but if safety is your primary concern, maybe bridge is not for you.

2♣: 2♦, 2NT will usually be a balanced hand, but here 2NT is sensible, practical rebid.


The deal comes from the Yeh Cup Online Open Teams, held in August and organized by the Taiwan Contract Bridge League (see yesterday's column for more details). Each match played different boards. This was Board 1 in Australia I (Sophie Ashton – David Wiltshire, Peter Gill – Sartaj Hans, Andy Hung – Jamie Thompson) vs Australia II (Renee Cooper – Ben Thompson, Andy Braithwaite – Arjuna De Livera, Matt Mullamphy – Ian Thomson – Ron Klinger).

South's textbook $3 \bullet$ was certainly reasonable, but there was a huge price to pay. East led the $\checkmark 3$: ace – five (low-like) – two. Declarer cashed A, K, crossed to the K, cashed three more clubs and played the K9: three – eight – king. East had thrown a heart and so V0 and V7 to VK gave the defence four tricks, V50 for one off.

This was yesterday's problem: With neither side vulnerable, there are two passes to East. What would you do as East with:

Opening light in third seat would normally be based on a hand of 9-11 points, perhaps an 8-count with a very strong suit. Opening with 3 points is known as a 'psyche', a bluff bid. I am not averse to a psychic bid, but it is a 2-edged sword. You might be able to talk the opposition out of their best spot, but it can also cost you heavily.

We will never know where South would have landed if East had passed, but 3NT by South had no problems whatsoever. After West led the ♥5: two − three − ten, South emerged with 12 tricks for +490 and 11 Imps to Australia II, but Australia I won the match by 27-24.
