Dealer West: Both vulnerable

North ♠ KJ ♥ A108 ♦ 954 ♣ AKJ			
South ▲ 843 ♥ QJ96 ◆ 1063 ♣ Q5			
West Pass Pass	North 1 ☆ 3♥	East Pass All Pass	South 1♥

- 1. West leads \mathbf{A} : four two (low-like) six.
- 2. West continues with the $\diamond Q$: five seven six.
- 3. West plays the \blacklozenge J: nine eight ten.
- 4. West switches to the $\bigstar 2$.

Not long ago I was re-re-reading an old bridge book (*Bridge Logic*, by the late Hugh Kelsey) when a couple of newspaper clippings fell out. They are undated, but you can gauge their age, as they have yellowed quite a bit. The problem above came from a bridge column by B. J. Becker (USA).

Where is the king of hearts?

We cannot be sure of the location of the $\forall K$, but since we have lost three diamonds and we are bound to lose at least one spade, we should play West for the $\forall K$. It is far more likely that West has $\forall K-x$, $\forall K-x-x$ or $\forall K-7-5-4$ than East having the $\forall K$ singleton.

What do you know about the West hand? West has shown up with 6 points, the *****K, *****Q, *****J.

What else do you know about West?

Oh, yes, West is a passed hand, so West will not have more than 12 HCP and probably not even 12.

So if we give West the $\forall K$ and $\diamond K$ -*Q*-*J*, where is the $\diamond A$?

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	North ▲ KJ ♥ A1083 ♦ 954 ♣ AKJ10		West will not have the $\forall K, \diamond K$ -Q-J and the $\Rightarrow A$ and pass initially. Therefore, if you are going to make this contract, you should play the $\Rightarrow J$ on the $\Rightarrow 2$. Result: nine tricks.
West ♠ Q1072 ♥ K5 ♠ KQJ ♣ 9864	South ▲ 843 ♥ QJ962 ◆ 1063 ▲ Q5	East ▲ A965 ♥ 74 ◆ A872 ♣ 732	Incidentally, if East captures the \bigstar J with the \bigstar Q and returns a spade to West's ace, you know that East began with the \blacktriangleleft K. You will cash the \blacktriangleleft A and hope the \blacktriangledown K is singleton and then you will be only one down.

West leads the \$3, fourth-highest. You draw trumps. East follows once and then discards two hearts. Plan the play.
