365. Another major dilemma

This was yesterday's puzzle:

You are the dealer at favourable vulnerability. What would you do with:

▲ K10653
♥ KQJ863
♦ 9
♣ 6

You do not have a weak 2♦ or 2♥, both majors, available.

In yesterday's column, we saw a player opening 14 in first seat with neither side vulnerable on this hand:

- **♦** K108764
- ♥ A9643
- ♦ ---
- **♣** 76

At the other tables, South passed. What about today's hand? The points in favour of bidding are: (1) The vulnerability is favourable, (b) You have 9 HCP points, not a paltry 7 and (c) Your 6-card suit is much stronger than yesterday's 6-card suit.

The downside of opening $1 \lor$ on today's hand is that you are not strong enough to reverse with a $2 \bigstar$ rebid and show the 6-5 pattern later, whether partner responds 1NT or bids 2-minor. That means you might miss a 5-3 spade fit. Sometimes one can open with the higher-ranking suit ($1 \bigstar$ here) and rebid in hearts. With the great difference in suit quality, that sequence does not appeal. Still, given the powerful nature of the heart suit, you could open $1 \blacktriangledown$ and might find partner with 2+ hearts. That will probably be as good as a 5-3 fit in spades.

Personally, I would pass. You are very likely to have a chance to show the majors later.

The deal arose in a club pairs' duplicate and West did very well by choosing to open.

Dealer West : North-South vulnerable



As you can see, North-South can make 13 tricks in clubs and, via the spade finesse, 7NT. It is hard to see how North-South could have done that after West's 1.

Dealer West : North-South vulnerable



No pair bid a grand slam and only one pair found $6 \clubsuit$ for a top board. Some played in 3NT for good results. Others played in 5 \clubsuit. Note that even if West had been doubled for penalties in 4 ♥, West could score five trump tricks and two ruffs in dummy (after North leads, say, ♥A and a second heart). That would be -500 for East-West, but still an excellent score, given North-South can make game plus.

Two North-South pairs failed in $4 \ge 0$. One went two off, -200, second bottom, and the other was three off, -300, and a bottom.
