12 tricks on a $\diamond K$ lead. On $₫ Q$ lead, you duck, win $\uparrow$ next, then have to lead $\diamond 4$ ! This shuts out North as you set up hearts. You work it out!

Note that the $\diamond 4$ ploy rates to work even if North has $\diamond Q$, since he is likely to play low.
