# 4S P 6C All Pass

Sue Picus's 4C was Roman Keycard Gerber and 4S showed two of the five keycards for clubs

For China, Yalan Zhang led D6, won by dummy's jack. Holding Kxxx in trumps, Yalan could have deduced that, as two keycards cannot be missing on this auction, partner cannot have DA, thus SJ was a far safer lead.

Jill Levin won SA, played a heart to the ace and ruffed a spade. Now C10 held, and a club to the jack won. Had Gu held CKxx, she would have ducked C10 then won CJ and played her third club, leaving declarer a trick short. Levin continued by ruffing a spade and playing a diamond to claim 12 tricks.

In the Open, Rodwell-Meckstroth bid 1H - 2C (strong enquiry) - 3C - 4S (RKCB for clubs) - 5D - 6C.

South (Nunes) led a diamond to declarer's jack. Very quickly, Meckstroth embarked on a superior line. He crossed to SA, played C5 to the jack to solve his entry problems, ruffed a spade with C8 and led C10. Fantoni covered with the king, so Meckstroth crossed to C9 and soon afterwards claimed 1370.

Wen Fei (partnering Hong Lin Wang) for China was given a greater challenge by SJ lead against her 6C contract. Wen Fei won the ace and thought for a long time. Then DA and a small diamond towards dummy. "Ruffing air" seems unpromising, so Molson-Seamon (partnering Sokolow) threw a heart (is a spade better?) as dummy's king won. SK to pitch the diamond, HA, spade ruff with C8, HK, HJ ruffed with CJ, spade ruff with C9, H10 ruffed perforce by C4 and overruffed with the queen. In the three card ending Wen Fei had C105 and a heart opposite CA2 and a diamond. By now, she had a complete count of the hand - North had one diamond, four hearts, four spades and thus four clubs to the king, confirming her suspicions that North must have CKxxx to not ruff the diamond. So she exited with the diamond throwing hre heart, and North had to ruff and lead away from CK. An enormously satisfying ending in a World Championship Final.
