

230. Your suit or another?

Dealer East : Nil vulnerable

What would you lead as West from:

- ♠ 853
- ♥ 10
- ♦ Q97
- ♣ J109653

This problem comes from the excellent *Winning Notrump Leads*, by David Bird and Taf Anthias. In the 'Beats Contract' results, the ♥10 scored 15.7% and the ♣J 15.5%.

This was yesterday's problem:

What would you lead as West from:

The problem is different from the Bird-Anthias one: (a) the clubs are weaker (b) partner's 1♦ does not promise the length that is shown by 1♥, (c) your hand here has no prospect of an outside entry compared to the ♦Q possibility in the first problem, and (d) the bidding is more tell-tale here after the use of 2♣ Stayman,

For the club lead to work you need one of these layouts:

Within the realms of the hands that South might hold, the above layouts would be rarities. The North-South bidding is also helpful. South has no 4-card major. For South to have only 2 clubs, South would need to have a 3-3-5-2 pattern or, less likely, 3-2-6-2 / 2-3-6-2.

Bird-Anthias had this to say: 'When you hold a singleton in partner's suit, you need a fairly strong sequence to justify leading something different.' I would add that you also should have some prospect of an outside entry.

West led the ♣6: ten – ♦2 – ♣2. After ♠5: three – queen – six, South played the ♠4: two – ten – ace. East returned a spade to dummy's ♠K, declarer played the ♦3 to the ♦K and had 11 tricks, +460.

At the other table, the auction differed, but substantially the same information was revealed as far as South's major suits were concerned:

West led the ♦9: jack – queen – four. East continued with the ♦A and ♦10 (suit-preference for spades). South cashed the ♣A, ♠K, ♣Q, ♥A, ♥K, ♥Q and the defence had the rest, two down, East-West +100 and +11 Imps.
