Dealer East : North-South vulnerable

What would you do as East with:

- ♠ 72
- ♥ Q
- ♦ J874
- ♣ AJ10742

Today's deal arose in the 2017 Spingold (USA K-O Open Teams) semi-final between [LAVAZZA](#) and [SCHWARTZ](#). Given the vulnerability, I would have expected both Easts to open 3♣. Neither did.

Yes, I know it is only a 6-card suit, but the 6-4 pattern makes up for that. The shortage in both majors makes a pre-emptive opening attractive. Given the A-J-10 holding in clubs, the hand is close to 7 losers and so 6 playing tricks. Maybe their standards for a 3♣ opening at favourable vulnerability are lower than this holding.

West led the ♣K, followed by the ♣5 to the ♣A. East switched to the ♦4: five – ten – ace. Declarer played the ♥J: queen – ace – five, followed by the ♠5 to the ♠Q, ♦6 to the ♦Q, ♠6: ten – ace – seven and ♦K, pitching the ♠9. Then came ♦9: ♦J – ♠J – ♠K. East exited with a club. South ruffed and made the last three tricks for +620.

- (3) Spade support or heart support
- (4) Which is it?

There are two interesting features about the auction: (1) As 2♣ was artificial, East could have doubled to suggest a club lead or a sacrifice; (2) Did North choose hearts as the trump suit to protect against the opening lead in case South had ♠K-x or ♣A-Q?

West led the ♦2: six – seven – queen. South played the ♥A at trick 2, dropping East's ♥Q. That made life much easier for South than South's play of the ♥J from dummy at the other table. Then came the ♥10, ♥J, ♦A, ♦K, discarding the ♣9, followed by the ♠A and the ♣3 to the ♠J and ♠K. West switched to the ♣5. East took the ♣A and played the ♦J, ruffed with the ♥7 and over-ruffed by the ♥9. South had the rest, 10 tricks, +620, no swing.

When the deal was replayed in a game on BBO, East opened 3♣.

Declarer made six clubs and a diamond ruff in dummy. That was three off, –150, but a good score for East-West.
